

Keeping Track of your 4-H Activities

The new program year started September 1 and it is time once again to keep track of your 4-H activities. The easiest way to keep track is by using a calendar. Place a calendar in your bedroom and every time you attend a 4-H activity, go to a project meeting, etc. Write it down on your calendar and then transfer it over to your PDR as the year goes on. Try not to wait to do your APR (annual project record form) and PDR at the last minute. 4-H Record Books

A 4-H Record Book is a standard record of your activities in 4-H - your projects, activities, events, skills development and learning experiences. The 4-H Record Book helps you improve your skills in record keeping, goal management and reflection on your achievements and growth in 4-H. You can submit your record book for evaluation at the club, county and state levels.

The Record Book and Achievement Program and optional and separate program. We highly recommend you take advantage of both programs to maximize your growth and learning in 4-H.

Record Book Manual

The Record Book Manual and Record Book Forms are separate documents. Each county must come into alignment with these versions and eliminate all supplemental forms and/or other requirements.

<u>Record Book Manual (PDF)</u> - This manual outlines all the parts of the Record Book and includes instructions for completing each form.

Lassen County 4-H Youth Program Becoming a 4-H Adult Volunteer



All 4-H adult volunteers must apply and be appointed annually. Please follow the steps below to apply to be a 4-H adult volunteer.

Contact Lassen County 4-H Office

You sign up as a volunteer through the Lassen County 4-H Extension office that is located at: 707 Nevada Street, Susanville, (530) 251-8285. The 4-H Representative and Extension staff can help you find clubs near you and start you on the process of becoming a volunteer.

All New Volunteers are Screened

Our #1 priority in 4-H is the safety of young people. We do all we can to protect young people and keep them safe while they are in our care. An important part of providing a safe environment is to conduct background checks on our volunteers and staff.

Everyone that will be spending an extended time with our 4-H youth is screened. When you become a 4-H volunteer, you are part of the plan to keep our young people safe.

1. Complete the online 4-H Volunteer Interest Survey

The 4-H Volunteer Interest Survey is the first step in becoming a new 4-H volunteer.

2. Complete a Live Scan background check with the California Department of Justice.

All new 4-H adult volunteers must complete a <u>Live Scan background check</u> with the California Department of Justice. Request for livescan forms is available at the 4-H Extension office.

- You will make an appointment: Lassen County Office of Education, 472-013 Johnstonville Rd, Susanville, CA 96130 * (530) 257-2196. Appointments are usually made on Tues/Wed/Thurs.
- You will need to take your Driver's License or official identification and \$10 cash for the Live Scan Fee.
- If you have lived out of California for ten years or less, your "Request for Live Scan Service" will be checked with the FBI.
- We will be notified by ANR Risk Management when you have cleared DOJ.

Step 2: Pay your 4-H Enrollment Fees Online, pay the enrollment fees to your Community Club Leader, or the 4-H Extension office (\$75 for Youth, \$28 for Adult Volunteer Leader).

Checks payable to: UC Regents. Enrollments will not be approved until payment has been received in the 4-H Extension office, 707 Nevada St, Susanville, CA.

How do you join 4-H or re-enroll?

There are eight 4-H clubs in Lassen County. Pick a 4-H club you would like to join, then contact the club leader, or stop by the 4-H Office at 707 Nevada Street.


Enrollment is open **September 1 through November 15**, but enrollment in some clubs may become closed during that time depending on their size and capacity.

Any youth between the ages of 5 through 19 are eligible to enroll.

The youth member insurance fee is \$75.00, and the adult volunteer leader insurance fee is \$28.00.

Explanation of Pins, Stripes, Leadership & Star Ranks

Primary (5 to 8 years old): Primary members receive a primary pin and green service strip. They do not have to keep project records.

Junior Member (4th & 5th grade) and Intermediate Member (6th, 7th & 8th grade): Junior members who complete their annual project report will receive a year pin and green service stripe each year. When they are a Junior Leader (6th -8th grade), they receive a green stripe with gold and Junior Leader patch for their hat.

Senior Member (9th to 12th grade): Senior members who complete their annual project report will receive year pin and white service stipe. When they are a Teen Leader, they receives a white stripe with gold and teen leader patch for their hat.

Star Ranks—Members work towards receiving a Gold, Bronze, Silver, Gold, Platinum, Emerald Star, and Ambassador Ranks must complete their Personal Development Report and annual project records at the end of the program year. They are also eligible to apply for scholarship opportunities.

Steps to Success in 4-H FAQ

1. Why was the Steps to Success in 4-H created?

There are four main reasons the <u>Steps to Success in 4-H</u> was needed:

(1) To make sure that every youth has the same opportunities for success in 4-H. For example, now being a member in good standing means the same thing in each club and in each county, and youth who earn a year stripe and pin all did the same thing to get it;

(2) To make 4-H easier to understand for new families. The program is complex and this is one of the reasons new families leave 4-H;

(3) To remove barriers for youth and families to participate in 4-H, such as attendance require ments, and develop pathways for them to deepen their 4-H experience; and

(4) Provide progression within the recognition system:

- Project meeting attendance + completion of the Annual Project Report (APR) Form = year pin and stripe;
- 100% club attendance = 100% attendance pin;
- 80% project and club attendance = Record Book requirement for any achievement rank; (Star Ranks: Bronze, Silver, Gold, Platinum, Emerald, Ambassador)
- Completion of the Record Book = star ranking system and county/state Record Book awards.
- 2. Are the Steps to Success in 4-H required by policy or optional?

The <u>Steps to Success in 4-H</u> are required by policy. The document summarizes several 4-H policies. These policies are: member in good standing, project completion, club participation, meeting attendance, and eligibility to show at fair (see the <u>4-H Policy Handbook</u>, Chapter 5 and 7).

3. Do the lower steps have to be met before a youth can do the higher steps?

Sometimes, but not always. When the lower steps must be meet first this is stated in the <u>Steps to Success in 4-H</u>. For example, to complete a project a member must be in good standing. However, project completion is not always required for event participation.

4. Why is the Personal Development Report (PDR) Form and/or Record Book not required to earn a year stripe and pin?

Recordkeeping is an important part of 4-H and we want to encourage youth members to practice this skill. Only the Annual Project Report (APR) Form is tied to project participation. The PDR is tied to other learning experiences both in and outside of 4-H. As such, only the APR is required for project completion and to earn the year stripe and pin. The PDR is part of the Record Book and, as such, is tied to the star ranking system and county/state Record

5. Can counties be stricter than the state?

No, the 4-H policies in the <u>Steps to Success in 4-H</u> apply to all 4-H projects, units, clubs, programs, and counties.

6. Can we have other requirements for project completion such as a demonstration or presentation?

No, as mentioned in #5 above, counties cannot add other requirements. In addition, every youth should not be required to do a demonstration or presentation to be in 4-H. However, it is great to offer youth opportunities to demonstrate or present in each project.

7. Can the Annual Project Report (APR) be required to earn the 100% attendance pin?

No, the 100% attendance pin is awarded for perfect attendance at all 4-H club meetings (in addition to being a member in good standing). See <u>List of Achievement Pins</u>.

8. How will <u>Steps to Success in 4-H</u> make a 4-H club stronger?

As mentioned in #1 above, one goal of the <u>Steps to Success in 4-H</u> is to remove barriers for youth and families to participate in the 4-H YDP and create pathways for them to deepen their 4-H experience. This should help grow 4-H membership.

If youth cannot attend a club meeting because they have other obligations (school, family, work, sports, etc.) and we require them to attend 4-H meetings to be in the club then they will either leave the club or not join at all. Youth should be able to participate in these other activities AND be part of 4-H.

California 4-H will decline in membership if we require more and more of youth and families. The best strategy for providing a high-quality youth development experience that serves to day's youth and families is to have fun, engaging and valuable club meetings and an incen tives and recognition program that motivates attendance.

9. What can we do to encourage youth to attend club meetings?

80% attendance in project and club meetings is a Record Book requirement for any achievement rank and the 100% attendance pin is awarded for perfect club attendance. County incentives and recognition committees may come up with other ways to motivate at tendance, such as attendance points and drawings for prizes (see <u>https://ucanr.edu/sites/UC4-H/files/19864.pdf</u>). For more information on the use of incentives and recognition to motivate youth and help them reach their goals, see the 4-H Policy Handbook, Chapter 13

10. What resources are there to help club leaders make club meetings more fun, engaging and valuable?

Some resources are currently available on the State 4-H website under Club Leader Resources. Face-to-face and virtual workshops are offered occasionally that equip leaders to engage youth in the program. These workshops are announced in the monthly newsletter, on the website, and through social media when they are offered. 11. Why is there no attendance requirement for clubs?

Attendance at 4-H club meetings is designed to be a valuable learning experience for youth. If youth are not attending, we should ask WHY? rather than add attendance requirements. To motivate participation create a fun, enjoyable, and valuable club experience so that youth and families choose to attend versus feeling like 4-H is just another thing they have to do. It is important to recognize that some youth join 4-H just for Shooting Sports, livestock, or cooking projects for example. As a youth development organization we should nurture their sparks. We need to be flexible in how 4-H programs are offered in order to meet the needs of today's youth and families. If youth are participating in project meetings great, if they are also participating in 4-H club meetings even better, and if they are also participating in 4-H events and activities even better! The goal of the Steps to Success in 4-H is to remove barriers for youth and families to participate in 4-H and develop pathways for them to deepen their 4-H experience.

12. Can we require club attendance for 4-H officers?

Yes, club officers are not able to fulfill the responsibilities of their office if they do not attend meetings.

13. Can project leaders make club attendance a requirement for project completion?

No. Participation in any single activity should not be tied to participation in another (see the 4-H Policy Handbook, Chapter 5, IX). However, project leaders may determine the number of hours of project instruction necessary to achieve the goals of the project and, therefore, complete the project.

14. Why can project leaders require hours but not % attendance to complete a project?

USDA requires at least six hours of project instruction for project completion, and that is why this is the minimum number of hours for project completion. The number of hours of project instruction is a better indicator of whether or not project goals will be met than the % of meetings attended.

15. When can attendance in 4-H be required?

Attendance may be required when it is directly related to being able to meet responsibilities of a position/role or to participate safely in a related experience. For example, attendance at club meetings may be required of club officers because they are not able to fulfill the responsibilities of their office if they do not attend meetings; attendance at camp counselor meetings may be required of camp counselors to be able to perform the responsibilities of their position/role; and attendance in the horse project may be required to safely participate in a horse show. See the 4-H Policy Handbook, Chapter 5, IX).

16. Why can project leaders make requirements but club leaders cannot?

Project leaders can make requirements for the number of hours of project instruction because they tie project work to safety and mastery of a skill. See question 11 for why there is no club attendance requirement.

17. Why can leaders of 4-H Community SPIN Clubs establish attendance as a requirement?

For 4-H Community SPIN Clubs, the project work occurs during SPIN Club meetings. Because project meetings occur during the same scheduled meeting as the SPIN Club meeting, this is not mandating the project youth to any additional attendance requirements and is permissible. The project leader will continue to set the number of hours of project instruction necessary to meet the project goals and complete the project.

18. What is the best practice for Project Leaders to provide the Project Completion requirements to a 4-H member?

It is a best practice that notification of 4-H project completion requirements should be provided to the member and their family upon enrollment. Ideally, project completion requirements and summary of project learning experience would be shared digitally to inform and help families plan and prepare. Any 4-H Project experiences must be develop mentally appropriate for participants and appropriate for the delivery mode. 4-H personnel have responsibility to approve and evaluate all curricula for local, county use. A template has been created for 4-H Project Leaders to use and easily create a <u>4-H Annual Project</u> <u>Plan</u> to support this.

Additionally, there are certain 4-H projects that carry a higher risk, e.g., certain forms of water sports or equine activities, or any other project requiring specialized safety equipment use. In such cases, 4-H personnel should work with Project Leaders to review <u>Project Safety and Risk Management Planning Tool</u> to help mitigate risk while planning the 4-H project.

19. Should there be opportunities to make-up missed project meeting or learning activity?

It is important to recognize that there are many reasons that a youth member may need to occasionally miss a club/project meeting or other learning opportunity. This could include illness, family commitments, school activities, etc. Adult volunteer leaders should make reasonable opportunities for members to make up a missed meeting or learning activity. In promoting healthy communities, we must recognize that illnesses will occur among members and must reinforce the principle that anyone should stay home when they are ill or experiencing symptoms of illness. The principles of healthy communities have always applied to program delivery, but since March 2019, it has become even more important, as we navigate the challenges and effects of emerging diseases and a global pandemic.

Staff and volunteer leaders should be flexible to allow makeup opportunities where members can achieve the learning objectives in other ways or can demonstrate their competency, if they are not able to attend a meeting or activity in person. This could include a variety of measures, such as allowing the option of participating in a meeting or activity virtually (e.g., zoom, etc.), attending other similar learning opportunities, independently reviewing information and demonstrating mastery of the learning objectives, etc.

20. How do we handle quorum requirements?

The 4-H club bylaws may define a quorum as the number of persons present at the meeting (see Robert's Rules of Order).
